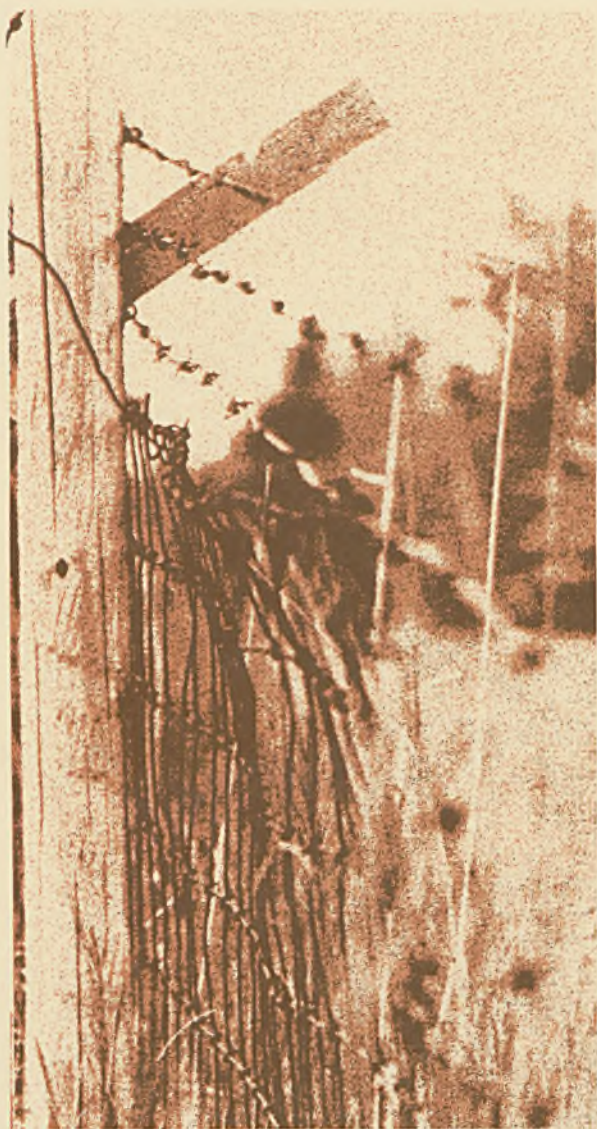

General Information

The Lexington Marriott Resort Hotel, headquarters for the 1984 Oral History Association Annual Meeting, is located on Newtown Pike, just off Interstates 64 and 75 and a mile from downtown Lexington. A complete resort facility, the Marriott provides indoor and outdoor pools, exercise room, sauna, lighted tennis courts and a PGA-rated, 18-hole golf course, as well as attractive conference facilities.

September in central Kentucky is generally warm, with temperatures in the seventies and eighties. Light layers of clothing are suggested, with warm weather apparel taking precedence. Bluejeans may be preferred for the Friday barbecue, and running togs are in order for those planning to participate in the OHA Kentucky Fun Run on Saturday morning.

Historic Lexington offers such attractions as Ashland, the home of Henry Clay; Henry Clay's law office; the Hunt-Morgan House; the Mary Todd Lincoln House; Gratz Park, containing eighteenth and nineteenth century architecture; and many antebellum homes located on the area's thoroughbred farms. Also of interest to the visitor will be the Keeneland Race Course, the Red Mile Trotting Track and the Kentucky Horse Park.

Other noteworthy attractions in the Lexington vicinity include the Headley-Whitney Museum and the University of Kentucky Art Museum. Among the many places of historic interest in nearby Frankfort are the Old State Capitol Building, which houses the Museum of the Kentucky Historical Society, and the Military History Museum. In the surrounding area visitors will enjoy Shakertown at Pleasant Hill, a restored Shaker community featuring Shaker architecture, native Kentucky crafts and traditional cookery. The first permanent settlement west of the Alleghenies has been recreated at Fort Harrod, where log buildings, period furnishings, a museum, the original cemetery and two outdoor dramas present a comprehensive picture of frontier life in the eighteenth century.

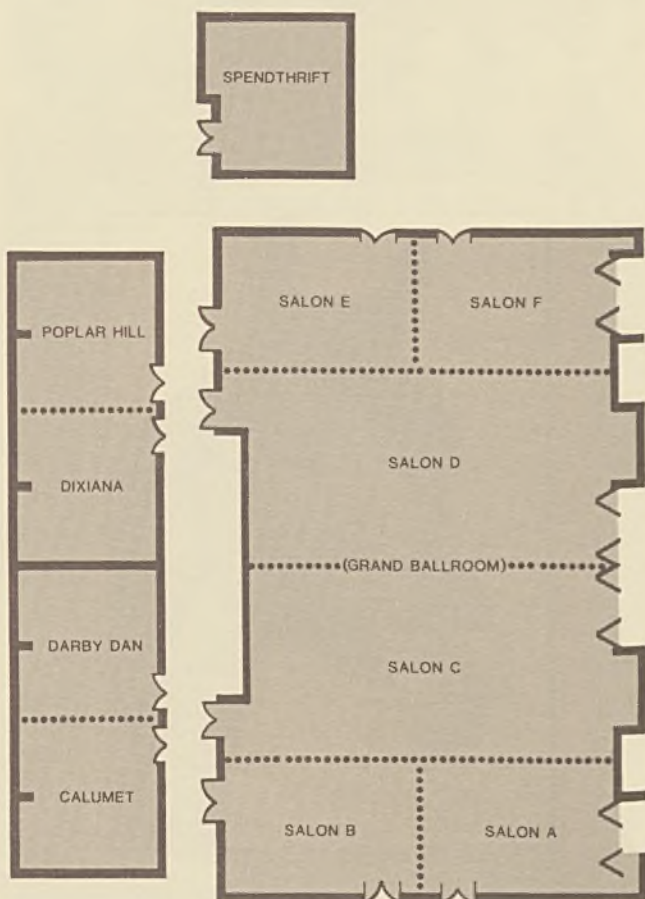

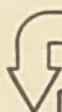

Byron Crawford

During his 21-year career in radio, television and newspaper work, Byron Crawford has interviewed personalities from Richard Nixon to John Wayne, from Pete Rose to Muhammed Ali. In his pursuit of unusual stories, Crawford has flown glider planes, ridden with crop dusters and shot pool with Minnesota Fats.

Crawford covered the U.S. Court of Appeals for Post-Newsweek's WCKY in Cincinnati before moving to WHAS Radio in Louisville. There he joined WHAS Television and hosted the syndicated feature series "Sideroads." In 1979 he became Kentucky Columnist for the *Louisville Courier-Journal*, where he now writes a column dedicated to the humor, history and folklore of his native Kentucky.



John Egerton

John Egerton is a free-lance writer presently living in Nashville, Tennessee. His five books and more than two hundred articles deal mainly with the theme of the American South. Articles by Egerton have appeared in such publications as *American Heritage*, *Saturday Review*, *The Nation* and *The Atlantic*, and he has made guest appearances on "The Today Show" and "The Advocates." His most recent work, *Generations: An American Family*, chronicles the story of a Kentucky family from pioneer days to the present.



William Greider

William Greider served as a Washington correspondent for the *Louisville Times* and the *Louisville Courier-Journal* before joining the staff of the *Washington Post* in 1968. As a general assignment reporter Greider covered presidential campaigns, civil disorders, Watergate investigations and the economic fluctuations of the seventies.

In 1981 his article in *The Atlantic*, "The Education of David Stockman," stirred considerable controversy. It has since been expanded into a book for E. P. Dutton.

Greider is presently National Editor for *Rolling Stone* and writes a biweekly column on politics and national affairs.



Joan Hoff-Wilson

Joan Hoff-Wilson is Executive Secretary of the Organization of American Historians and has been Professor of History at Indiana University since 1981. She has been a Guggenheim and a Woodrow Wilson Fellow, a Guest Scholar at the Brookings Institution and a Visiting Scholar at the Harvard Law School. Her publications have received a number of distinguished awards. A specialist in American diplomatic and political history, Hoff-Wilson has written on the modern presidency and has published widely on the subject of women's history.
