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

WELCOME



I t is a great pleasure to welcome you to the 1989 Annual Meeting of the Oral History Association. We are trying to accomplish three goals through our program: to emphasize that oral history is a diverse and multifaceted movement; to keep abreast with current trends by updating and revising the *Evaluation Guidelines*; and to encourage closer bonds between OHA and the state and regional oral history groups.

The program sessions certainly emphasize the diversity of the oral history movement. The topics deal with women's history, ethnicity, community history, methodology, elitism, philosophic approaches, music, military history, technology, business history, teaching applications, and other aspects of our craft. Our main speakers, Jose Limón, Eliot Wigginton, and Bill and Bobbie Malone also provide evidence of oral history's diversity.

Any first-rate professional organization must maintain an up-to-date publications program, and that is why we find it necessary to modernize the *Evaluation Guidelines*, originally published in 1980. Rapid advances in technology mandate a new section on videotaping; changes in the legal aspects make it necessary to update the section on Ethical/Legal Guidelines. The current *Evaluation*

Guidelines provide no standards for unaffiliated interviewers; nor do they address standards for the ever-expanding classroom applications of oral history. To democratize the process for adopting these revisions, we determined that the best forum would be the Annual Meeting, where prepared drafts can be discussed and modified before adoption at the business meeting.

We want it said that 1989 was the year that OHA took major steps in meeting the needs of the state and regional organizations. To this end we have had a committee selected by these groups working on the establishment of an Affiliated Status. The committee's proposals will be discussed at the session built into the program for the


state and regional groups.

MAIN SPEAKERS

Eliot Wigginton
"The Foxfire Experience"
Friday, October 20, 12:15 p.m.

en years ago, Eliot Wigginton was cited by Time in a cover story as one of fifty emerging national leaders. Foxfire magazine, which he launched in 1966 in his Rabun County High School English classes, has been widely heralded as a way to make education relevant and students enthusiastic about learning. In 1968 he founded The Foxfire Fund, Inc., a nonprofit educational corporation. Articles from Foxfire magazine make up the contents of the nine-volumes Foxfire book series (published by Doubleday) with sales approaching eight million copies with royalties income going to benefit The Foxfire Fund, Inc. The Broadway play, Foxfire, based on the contents of these books, was broadcast in 1987 as a Hallmark Hall of Fame special. Wigginton received an A.B. in English and a M.A. in Teaching from Cornell University, and also a M.A. in English from Johns Hopkins University. He has received numerous honorary Ph.D.s, as well as many other awards including the John D. Rockefeller III Youth Award for his work with young people, and the Kurt Hahn Award of the Association for Experimental Education.

Jose E. Limón

"When the Oral is Primal: The Mexicans of Southern Texas"

Thursday, October 19, 7:00 p.m.

Jose E. Limón is Chariman of American Studies and Associate Professor of American Studies at the University of California, Santa Cruz. He is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, holding a B.A. in Philosophy (1966), M.A. in English (1969), and Ph.D. in Anthropology (1978). Dr. Limón recently spent a year at the Stanford Humanities Center as a research fellow on a project relating oral tradition to written poetry. His forthcoming book, a product of his year at Stanford, is Mexican Ballads, Chicano Poems: History

and Influence in Mexican-American Social Poetics (published by the University of California Press). Another book, Dancing With the Devil: Society and Cultural Poetics in The Mexican-American South, will soon be published by the University of Wisconsin Press.

Bill C. Malone and Barbara S. Malone "Country Music and the South" Saturday, Ocotber 21, 7:30 p.m.

ill C. Malone is a Professor of History at Tulane University in New Orleans. He is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin (B.A., 1956; M.A., 1958; and Ph.D., 1965). In 1984-1985, he received the John Simon Guggenheim Fellowship for research on country music and the southern working class. His publications include Country Music, USA (1968, revised and enlarged in 1985), Stars of Country Music (1976) which he co-authored with Judith McCulloh, Southern Music/American Music (1979). He is the producer and annotator of Smithsonian Collection of Classical Country Music, a collection of eight LPs containing 143 recordings spanning the period from 1922 to 1975. He is also the author of encyclopedia articles, book reviews and review articles, and popular articles and record reviews on southern country, folk and religious music. Dr. Malone and his wife, Barbara S. ("Bobbie") Malone, conduct research in the areas of U.S. cultural history, southern folk culture, southern music, and American labor. The Malones frequently travel and lecture throughout the country.

WORKSHOP FEES

We have again scheduled a workshop to provide advanced "hands-on" technical training. This year there will be one advanced workshop (panel #9) "Public Programming Uses of Video Oral History." Preregistration is required and a \$10 fee will be charged to cover the cost of equipment.

CONCURRENT SESSIONS

There will be thirty-five small sessions held during the conference. Most consist of panels of two types: workshops focusing on the technical "howto" of oral history and regular scholarly panels. Following the trend of recent years, however, there are also panels devoted to audio-visual media and teaching. In general these presentations have been selected to emphasize the diverse nature of oral history. The workshops and regular panels will be held concurrently throughout the meeting as noted in the schedule.

EXHIBIT ROOM

The Topsail Room, located on the second floor of the San Luis Hotel, will be the area for exhibitions. Adjacent to the area for coffee breaks and conversation, the Topsail Room is also located near the rooms housing the concurrent sessions. As in the past years, commercial exhibits representing various publishers and equipment companies will be on display. Additional exhibits by various oral history-related groups will be offered. In keeping with tradition, the conference will futher offer historical/artistic exhibits, and curators will be present to continue the emphasis on public-community history.

EVALUATION GUIDELINES

A very important segment of the conference includes the revision and updating of the *Evaluation Guidelines*. The following procedures will be used for adoption:

- 1. Inclusion of drafts in registration packets.
- Forty-five-minute sessions built into program for discussion/revision of drafts.
- Posting of final drafts on Saturday morning at registration area.
- All amendments to final drafts to be submitted to appropriate Evaluations Subcommittee chairs prior to annual business meeting on Sunday.
- Five minute debate for each amendment at annual business meeting.
- 6. Adoption at annual business meeting.

FILMS, VIDEOS, MEDIA SHOWS

Oral history in the audio-visual media will again be an important presence at this year's meeting. The Friday night shows will feature the screening of several media presentations. On Saturday afternoon additional film/video documentaries will be shown.

OFFSITE SESSION

The appropriate site for the session on railroading (panel #28) is the Railroad Museum at the Center for Transportation and Commerce. In addition to housing railroading memorabilia and artifacts, the restored train station's Waiting Room contains the amazing "People's Gallery" where life-size 1932 travelers appear to be frozen in time.

Limo for panel session only leaves San Luis on Friday, October 20, at 3:30 p.m. No charge. Reser-

vations required.

SUMMATION AND EVALUATION SESSION

The conference will close with a collective summation led by Martha Ross. The summation session will focus on evaluating the conference in terms of the quality and diversity of the sessions. Participation by all attending is urged.
