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
WELCOME

PROGRAM FEATURES

MAIN SPEAKER

Byron Rushing Thursday, November 10, 7:00 pm

The Honorable Byron Rushing is a member of the Massachusetts House of Representatives from the 9th Suffolk District. Born in New York City, Representative Rushing has lived in Boston since 1964. During the 1960s he was active in the civil rights movement-working for CORE and the Northern Student Movement. From 1972 to 1985 he was president of the Museum of Afro-American History. Under his direction, the Museum evolved into a major research facility on Afro-American history in New England and on Roxbury. During his tenure, the Museum developed a program of changing exhibits, walking tours, oral history and slide tape presentations, archaeology, audiovisual collecting and loans. The Museum purchased and began the restoration of the African Meeting House, the oldest extant black church building in the United States. In 1976 he oversaw the lobbying effort in Congress to establish the Boston African American National Historical Site, a component of the National Park Service. The Museum took a leading role in the preservation of the history of neighborhoods in Roxbury. The Representative is a member of the House Committee on Ways and Means and the Taxation Committee. He is also serving as chairman of the State Commission on the 350th Anniversary of the Arrival of Africans in Massachusetts. As a layman he is actively involved in the Episcopal Church. His pubications include "I Was Born," Black Power Revolt. ed. by Floyd Barbour, 1968; "A Note on the Origin of African Orthodox Church," Journal of Negro History (1972); "Archaeology and the Museum of Afro-American History." in New England Historical Archaeology (The Dublin Seminar for New England Folklife Annual Proceedings, 1977. ed. by Peter Benes); "Black Schools in White Boston," From Common School to Magnet School: Selected Essays in the History of Boston's Schools (Boston Public Library, 1979); and "Afro-Americana: Defining it, Finding it, Collecting it," Museum News (January/February 1982).

"It Had To Be Done, So I Did It" Saturday, November 10, 7:30 pm

"It Had To Be Done So I Did It: Portraits of Rural New Hampshire Women at Work," is a presentation of the Warner Women's Oral History Project. Conceived and written by Judith Moyer, it features as performers Carol Kyne, Camie Morison, Catherine Cook, Justine Paul and Judith Moyer. The music used in the presentation was composed and is played by Justine Paul. "It Had To Be Done So I Did It" follows the lives of seventeen women who lived, or now live, in the town of Warner, New Hampshire. It concerns women and women's work in this century. The audience see them as farmers, teachers, and as wives and mothers. And hear women go to war, work for charities and in town governments, and work as domestics. The audience is treated to seventeen extraordinary lives, told through newspaper articles, letters and 100 hours of interviews (which filled 2,000 pages of transcripts). Using a minimum of props and costumes the five performers manage to convey a sense of reality, and finely tuned emotions, as they make the audience aware of the lives and work of women from a small town who wondered if "anyone would remember their names." Over a two - year period more than sixty women were interviewed for details of their working past. The presenters have performed this work for five years, to audiences totalling over 5000 people. And although the work is at times immensely funny and extremely touching, nothing has been fictionalized.

TEACHERS' WORKSHOP

The Oral History Association in conjunction with the Division of Graduate and Continuing Education of Salem State College is offering a one - day 3 credit workshop for teachers. The workshop will be offered on Saturday, November 10. In the program Saturday's sessions which are part of the workshop are so designated. Those seeking credit will be required to attend all sessions as well as the Saturday evening banquet and to fulfill all other requirement including the submission by January 4, 1991 of a curriculum unit into which oral history methodology has been integrated. The workshop will be under the direction of Prof. John J. Fox, Department of History, Salem State College. Tuition for the workshop for Massachusetts residents is \$315.00; for non-residents it is \$375.00. Participant will also be required to pay workshop registration of \$60.00 to the OHA. The registration includes a one -day registration, workshop fees and the Saturday evening banquet. Adjustments will be made for those who pay a full registration and buy the conference meal plan. 

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OFF SITE TOURS

The tours have been scheduled for Saturday November 10, between 12:00 noon and 6:30 p.m.

Tour #1 Historic Salem

Guided tour of the most historic town in Massachusetts. The tour will depart from the Royal Sonesta at 12:30 p.m. and return at 5:00 p.m. Site visits will be made to the Essex Institute, the House of Seven Gables and Pioneer Village. The tour will include a drive along Chestnut Street, the most historic street in the United States. Limited reservation. Pre-registration required. Tour fee of \$40.00 per person includes transportation and admission costs.

Tour #2 Boston's Cultural Heritage

Guided tour of Boston will be led by a folklorist and geographer. The walking tour, which will leave the Royal Sonesta at 1:00 p.m., will begin at the John Hancock Observatory in order to provide an overview of the sites and areas to be visited. During the tour changing the cultural landscape of Boston will be observed, examined and discussed. Site visits will include the Old State House, the Granary, Old City Hall, City Hall, Kings Chapel and Quincy Market. This tour is limited to 15 people. Pre-registration required. Tour #4 The Black Heritage Trail

The 1.6 mile walking tour of the Black Heritage Trail, conducted by National Park Service Rangers, explores the history of Boston's 19th century black community. Along the trail there are several pre-Civil War buildings crucial to black history of that era. Site visits will include the African Meeting House and the Augustus Saint-Gaudens' memorial to Robert Gould Shaw and the black Civil War soldiers of the 54th Regiment. Following the tour there will be time to shop in downtown Boston or take the subway to the Kennedy Library or Harvard Square. Tour will leave hotel at 1:00 PM. Pre-registration required. There is a tour fee of \$15.00 per person.

Tour #5 John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum Behind the Scene

This tour, which will be led by a Library staff member, will provide an opportunity to see the public exhibits relating to the life of John F. Kennedy and the career of his brother Robert F. Kennedy. The exhibit incorporates film, tape recordings, photographs, slides, letters, speeches, and hundreds of objects from the Library's extensive collection. The tour will also include a tour behind the scene; areas which are closed off to regular visitors. Those taking the tour are asked to be at the Library by 2:00 p.m. Directions will be provided on how to get there by car and subway. Pre-registration required. There is a tour fee of \$15.00 per person.


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
