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PRESIDENT'S WELCOME



N BEHALF OF THE ORAL HISTORY ASSOCIATION, it is my pleasure to welcome you to Albuquerque, New Mexico and the twenty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Oral History Association. Ideally located at the Sheraton Old Town in Albuquerque's *Plaza Vieja* (Old Town), this meeting brings to your doorstep the beauty, history and culture of this fascinating region. Over 100 boutiques and shops, excellent restaurants, several art galleries, the

Albuquerque Museum of Art, History and Science, Albuquerque Children's Museum, and the New Mexico Museum of Natural History, await the visitor in this historic area founded in 1706. New Mexico offers many other appealing destinations within a day's travel of Albuquerque. These include Santa Fé, Taos, the Navajo Nation, several pueblos, the Turquoise and Santa Fé Trails as well as national and state parks reflecting the fort, ranching, railroad, and mining histories of the area. Be sure to check with the registration desk on the many opportunities for exploring while visiting the Albuquerque area.

One of the most historically significant and culturally diverse areas of the United States, New Mexico provides an appropriate setting for a conference whose theme is "Practices, Policies and Prejudices: Challenging the Images of American Cultures." Conference chair Rose Díaz and the program committee have organized a variety of sessions addressing the historic and contemporary roles prejudice, public policies, conflict, and resistance have played in American history. In addition to sessions which emphasize the practice and application of oral history, we have also scheduled for Wednesday, October 26, a series of workshops on fundraising, preservation, cataloging, and oral history interviewing techniques. Thursday, October 27, a full day workshop has been organized in cooperation with National Public Radio.

Several excellent tours have been planneded by Jan Dodson Barnhart and the local arrangements committee for Friday evening, October 28, and Saturday afternoon, October 29. "Get your Kicks" on the Route 66 neon tour, tour an archeological dig and local wineries, visit the Pueblo Indian Cultural Center, climb the steps to Acoma Pueblo, or enjoy the sights of Santa Fé.

The program and local arrangements committees have devoted a tremendous amount of time and talent to organizing this meeting. That they were able to do so is due in large measure to the enthusiastic support received from three divisions at the University of New Mexico. A special thanks to Dr. Tobías Durán, Director, Center for Regional Studies -UNM, Dr. José Rivera, former Director, Dr. Eligio Padilla, Director, Southwest Hispanic Research Institute -UNM, and Robert Migneault, Dean of the UNM General Library, for their unprecedented support of conference organizing and planning. The support of the Friends of the Libraries, UNM Inc., is also gratefully acknowledged.

My sincere thanks to all who have worked for the past two years organizing this exciting conference. It has been a pleasure being a part of this effort, and it will be an honor to preside at this annual meeting of the Oral History Association. I hope you will join me in Albuquerque as we celebrate the diversity of regional cultures and enjoy the beauty of the Southwest.

ABOUT THIS MEETING

The 1994 OHA conference features a total of fifty-one panel sessions, four practical half-day workshops, one full-day workshop, one plenary session and three keynote addresses. Workshops and concurrent sessions are located in the Sheraton Old Town meeting rooms on the ground floor of the hotel unless otherwise specified.

FEATURED SPEAKERS

Nasario García is Professor of Languages in the Department of Languages, Literature, and International Affairs at New Mexico Highlands University, Las Vegas, New Mexico. Nasario's areas of specialization are Hispanic language, culture and folklore in New Mexico and the Southwest. He has published over forty works, including five books. Nasario is currently working on an oral history / photo documentary project entitled *Hispanic Folklore of the Río Pecos Valley*.

Jean Jordan has been instrumental in establishing the Chatauqua Program of the New Mexico Endowment for the Humanities and is active in a variety of bilingual international programs. As a performance artist she has appeared on television, stage and screen. Her vast experience as a scholar is enhanced by her work as a screen writer, producer, director and educator. Her participation and performance is generously sponsored by the New Mexico Endowment for the Humanities.

Dolores Huerta is the co-founder and first Vice President of the United Farm Workers of America. Currently, she directs the UFW's Collective Bargaining Department which includes farm worker organizing, ranch elections, strikes, and collective bargaining. In 1962 César Chávez and Dolores Huerta founded the National Farm Workers Association after nine years as organizers for the Community Service Organization. Dolores directed the grape boycott in 1970 which realized the first collective bargaining agreements for California farmworkers. Through the years Dolores has changed diapers between organizing meetings and nursed babies during breaks in negotiations. As an influential role model, Dolores has imparted to her eleven children, and a nation, a legacy of activism.

Lori Huerta de León advocates a continuing interest in "la causa" of the UFW (the farmworker's cause). Recognizing that intergenerational contributions are not acknowledged in the study of American political activism, Lori and Dolores bring a unique perspective to the obstacles faced by agricultural workers and community activists. The struggle persists to achieve adequate housing, education, legal and community services, health and safe work environments. This continues to challenge American declarations of equality and justice.

Rayna Green is Director of Native American Programs at the National Museum of American History (NMAH), Smithsonian Institution, Washington, DC. Rayna's research and writing interests are in applied areas of community, ethnic, and gender studies. She has consulted in film, television, radio, performance, recorded music productions, and museum exhibits. Under her direction, the NMAH has pursued and completed repatriation of tribal community artifacts throughout the United States. Rayna has published in several scholarly journals, popular magazines and has authored three books on Native women.

WORKSHOPS & FEES

OHA is again offering half-day workshop sessions led by experienced individuals. Workshops include audio and visual resource preservation; grants and funding; cataloging, preservation and access issues; an introductory oral history workshop; and an all day session on oral history and media production.

Preregistration is required for all these workshops.

Workshops require special fees to defray the cost of equipment and related materials. Enrollments may be limited, so interested participants should reserve space for themselves through preconference registration.

This year we are offering mini-workshops at *no additional fee*, scheduled during regular sessions. Attendance is limited and we strongly suggest registering at the time of conference registration.

WORKSHOPS

Audio and Visual Resource Preservation Workshop will be offered October 26, 1994 from 1:30pm to 5pm in the Potters Room. This workshop is limited to 20 participants and will be conducted by the AMIGOS Preservation Network (AMIGOS/Dallas). Ann Massman, Instructor (\$20.00 fee).

Grants and Funding Workshop will be offered October 26, 1994 from 1:30 pm to 5pm in the Weavers Room. This workshop is limited to 20 participants. Regina Chávez of the Hispanic Culture Foundation will moderate. Panel participants Barbara Paulson, NEH-Division of Preservation and Access, will discuss grant-funding at the national level; Craig Newbill, New Mexico Endowment for the Humanities, will discuss funding at the state level; Peter Mattair of the Fund for Folk Culture will provide information on private foundation funding (\$20.00 fee).

Oral History Cataloging, Preservation, and Access Workshop will be offered October 26, 1994 from 1:30pm to 5pm in the Turquoise Room. This workshop is limited to 20 participants. Kathlene Ferris of the Society for Southwest Archivists, will focus on cataloging in the MARC manuscripts format. Jim Parke, Southwest Micropublishing, Inc., will discuss the facilitation of preservation and public access through the use of micrographics (\$20.00 fee).

Oral History Introductory Level Workshop will be offered October 26, 1994 from 1:30pm to 5pm in the Isleta Room. This workshop will be limited to 20 participants and will be conducted by members of the Texas Oral History Association, Dr. Kenneth E. Hendrickson, Jr. and Janet Neugebauer (\$20.00 fee).

Advanced Media Workshop for Public Programming (Radio and Film) will be offered October 27, 1994 from 10am to 5:30pm. at KUNM Radio (transportation provided). This day-long workshop will be limited to 15 participants. A veteran producer/engineer for National Public Radio, Washington, DC., will direct the workshop. -Participants will gain an overview of recording techniques, analysis, and a familiarity with the latest equipment and technological innovations (\$80.00 fee).

EXHIBIT AREA

The Mercado Mall of the Sheraton, located on the ground floor, will feature exhibits by publishers, oral history centers, manufacturers, and community organizations. Conference participants are encouraged to visit the exhibits and meet authors and publishers of recent works. Exhibits open 8am Thursday to noon Saturday. ALBUQUERQUE TRAVEL INFORMATION

The Sheraton Old Town will serve as the conference hotel for the 1994 annual meeting. It is Albuquerque's only hotel located in the heart of the city's Old Town district. It is a spacious, southwestern-style hotel within walking distance of specialty shops, restaurants, galleries, and museums. The Sheraton offers 170 large guest rooms, 20 suites, non-smoking floors, hotel guest parking, two restaurants and lounges, and easy access to the freeway. ENVIRONMENT / CLIMATE

The average elevation in New Mexico is approximately 4,000 ft. (Albuquerque, 5,312 ft.; Santa Fé, 7,000 ft.; and Taos 6,965 ft.). These high elevations produce a crisp, invigorating, dramatic climate with definite changes of seasons. In Albuquerque, average daytime temperatures in October-November are between 60–70 degrees with nighttime temperatures between 32–45 degrees. The key word for clothing in New Mexico is "casual."

TRAVEL TIPS

By air: All major airlines serve Albuquerque. By Fail: Amtrak provides daily railroad service to and from Albuquerque. Two trains arrive daily: from Chicago, arriving at 4:55pm and the West Coast, arriving at 12:55 pm. Complimentary hotel shuttle obtained by calling 843-6300 upon arrival.

Acoma is located 52 miles west of Albuquerque on I-40, then 13 miles south.

Cochiti is located 45 miles northeast of Albuquerque via I-25 and State 22.

Isleta is located 10 miles south of Albuquerque on State 47.

Nambe is located 30 miles north of Santa Fé on U.S. 285, east 4 miles on State 4, follow the signs.

San Ildefonso is located 20 miles north of Santa Fé on U.S. 84/285, then turn west at Pojoaque towards Los Alamos on 502.

Santa Clara is located 20 miles north from Santa Fé on U.S. 285, west 8 miles on State 4 to State 30, north 6 miles and watch for signs pointing west to Puye Cliff Dwellings.




